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## Address to the PFLAG National Convention

As an English teacher, I like to share some of my favorite quotations — and so I would like to start today with some inspiring words from Margaret Mead who famously said: “Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world.” Doesn't this quote embody the spirit of PFLAG — which started nearly 40 years ago with one voice — a mother's voice — who spoke out courageously in support of her gay son?

That simple act ignited a movement ...and today, because of the work that you do, there are hundreds of thousands of voices across this country raised in support of our lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender sons and daughters, fathers and mothers, sisters and brothers, friends, neighbors, and coworkers.

I recently read an open letter written from a PFLAG father to America's youth. He wrote, “My wife and I have two sons. We think that they are the best kids in the whole world. They're very different, with very diverse personalities, talents, and interests. One of the other things that makes them different is that one is straight and one is gay. But the important thing is this: we love them equally.”

At its core — it's such a simple message — “we love our sons” — both of them. But that acceptance and support can make all the difference. And as you all know well — acceptance by those you love is the greatest acceptance of all.

We have all heard painful stories of bullying and harassment. And we have read too many accounts of heartbreaking incidents where kids are driven to take their own lives rather than endure the taunting of their peers. No child should be subjected to that. And no parent should suffer that horrific loss.

We know the devastating price of the failure to confront a hostile school climate where bullying and harassment can be daily occurrences. Together, we all need to stand up and do our part to keep all of our kids safe, and give them the love, support and acceptance they need to learn and grow and fulfill their dreams.

I want to say to each of you here today: thank you for raising your voice and working together to open minds, shift attitudes and support all of our sons and daughters, students and neighbors.

Some of you come from places where yours is the only voice of support and acceptance — but when you speak, people listen. And we need you to keep speaking out, to keep shining a light on this important issue.

As parents, friends, and families, you have the power to change hearts and minds with your stories of success and failure, tragedy and triumph. I commend you and hope you will all keep up this important work.

It also shows us that even though we live in California, there are still a lot of people out there who need our help."

Dear PFLAG Speakers,

I wanted to write to say thank you for taking the time to come to speak to our class. I found what you all had to say very interesting. I think it's great that you can share your stories with other people. I'm sure they give people in the audience something to relate to, something to share with a friend, something to inspire them, or at the very least, something to think about. I know that I got a lot out of the experience.

One thing that really stood out to me was when one of you shared that you joined PFLAG because you feel very strongly about people not using the phrase "that's so gay," and it made me think about the times I've said that. I don't mean to say it, it just comes out, and I always feel really embarrassed immediately after. It's not that I use that phrase a lot, but after you came to speak to my class I felt like I really needed to be careful not to say it again. And I'm happy to say, I haven't caught myself accidentally saying "that's so gay" once since then.

I also wanted to tell you about a friend of mine, who is gay. I thought of him when we were discussing how coming out could cause you to lose some of the people in your life. Some of you shared stories of friends, sisters, or brothers that don't accept you because you are gay. My friend, who is still in high school, has that problem with his parents. He comes from a very religious, Hispanic family. He is every stereotype of the "fierce gay guy" that there is and his parents know he's gay but they will not acknowledge it at all. They even tried to arrange a marriage between him and their friend's daughter. He's told me how out of place he feels in his own home, and how he hides out in his room when his family comes over because his parents made him feel like it is not ok to be himself. ... So I shared some of your stories with him. I told him how some of you went through similar situations and how a lot of you felt that, although it affects you, ultimately it is the other person's problem and they need to deal with it because you can't change who you are for anyone.

We had a really good talk and he knows that he has an amazing support system of people that love him unconditionally and we will be there for him when he goes through the tough times. I really think your stories gave him something to relate to ... especially because he doesn't have very many other gay people to talk to. So I wanted to thank you for that and let you know that sharing your stories helped someone. If my friend can get his parents to allow him to go, I would love to bring him to a PFLAG meeting so he can hear some of the stories first-hand. Hopefully I'll be able to make that happen, but in the meantime, thanks again.

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## Prop 8 Repeal Ballot Measure

Love Honor Cherish's ballot initiative to repeal Prop 8 was cleared by the California Secretary of State to start gathering signatures. The deadline is May 14 to collect 807,615 valid signatures to qualify for the November 2012 ballot.

The title and summary prepared for the petition reads: **Reinstates Right of Same-Sex Couples to Marry. Initiative Constitutional Amendment.** Repeals the current provision in California's Constitution that states only marriage between a man and a woman is valid or recognized in California. Provides that marriage is between only two persons and shall not be restricted on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, gender, sexual orientation, or religion. Clarifies that the initiative shall not be interpreted to require any priest, minister, pastor, rabbi, or other person to perform a marriage in violation of his or her religious beliefs. Read more:

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## Lesson on Bullying

A teacher in New York was teaching her class about bullying. She gave them the following exercise to perform: She asked her students to take a piece of paper and crumple it up, stomp on it, and really mess it up. Then she had them unfold the paper, smooth it out and look at how scarred and dirty it was. She then asked them to tell it they're sorry. Although they said they were sorry and tried to fix the paper, she pointed out all the scars that they left behind, and that those scars will never go away no matter how hard they tried to fix it. That is what happens when someone bullies a child; they may say they're sorry, but the scars are there forever. The looks on the faces of the children in the classroom told her the message hit home. ▼
